

This device is not intended for use in the direct field of view at visual display workplaces. To avoid incommoding reflexions at visual display workplaces this device must not be placed in the direct field of view.

The equipment is not intended for used at a video workstation in compliance BildscharbV.

The sound pressure level at the operator position is equal or less than 70 dB (A) according to ISO 7779.

#### WARNING:



This appliance is supplied with a moulded three pin mains plug for your safety and convenience. A 13 amp fuse is fitted in this plug. Should the fuse need to be replaced, please ensure that the replacement fuse has a rating of13 amps and that it is approved by ASTA or BSI to BS1362.

Check for the ASTA mark or the BSI mark  $\heartsuit$  on the body of the fuse.

If the plug contains a removable fuse cover, you must ensure that it is refitted when the fuse is replaced. If you lose the fuse cover, the plug must not be used until a replacement cover is obtained. A replacement fuse cover can be purchased from an Authorised Service Center.

# If the fitted moulded plug is unsuitable for the mains socket in your home, then the fuse should be removed and the plug cut off and disposed of safely. There is a danger of severe electrical shock if the cut off plug is inserted into any 13 amp socket.

As the colours of the wire in the mains lead of this appliance may not correspond with the coloured markings identifying the terminals in your plug, proceed as follows.

The wire which is coloured GREEN - AND - YELLOW must be connected to the terminal in the plug which is marked with the letter E or by the Earth symbol  $\perp$  or coloured GREEN or GREEN - AND - YELLOW.

The wire which is coloured BLUE must be connected to the terminal in the plug which is marked with the letter N or coloured BLACK.

The wire which is coloured BROWN must be connected to the terminal in the plug which is marked with the letter L or coloured RED.

How to replace the fuse: Open the fuse compartment with a screwdriver and replace the fuse.

#### During a thunderstorm, do not touch the projector or the cable.

Electric shocks can result.

#### Do not do anything that might damage the power cord or the power plug.

- If the power cord is used while damaged, electric shocks, short-circuits or fire will result.
- Do not damage the power cord, make any modifications to it, place it near any hot objects, bend it excessively, twist it, pull it, place heavy objects on top of it or wrap it into a bundle.

Ask an Authorized Service Center to carry out any repairs to the power cord that might be necessary.

#### Insert the power plug securely into the wall outlet.

If the plug is not inserted correctly, electric shocks or overheating will result.

- Do not use anything other than the provided power cord.
- Do not use the provided power cord for other electrical equipment.
- Do not use plugs which are damaged or wall outlets which are coming loose from the wall.

#### Clean the power plug regularly to prevent it from becoming covered in dust.

Failure to observe this will cause a fire.

- If dust builds up on the power plug, the resulting humidity can damage the insulation.
- If not using the projector for an extended period of time, pull the power plug out from the wall outlet.

Pull the power plug out from the wall outlet and wipe it with a dry cloth regularly.

#### Do not handle the power plug with wet hands.

Failure to observe this will result in electric shocks.

#### Do not overload the wall outlet.

If the power supply is overloaded (ex., by using too many adapters), overheating may occur and fire will result.

#### ON USE/INSTALLATION

#### Do not place liquid containers on top of the projector.

If water spills onto the projector or gets inside it, fire or electric shocks will result.

If any water gets inside the projector, contact an Authorized Service Center.

Do not place the projector on soft materials such as carpets or sponge mats.

Doing so will cause the projector to overheat, which can cause burns, fire or damage to the projector.

# Do not set up the projector in humid or dusty places or in places where the projector may come into contact with oily smoke or steam, ex. a bathroom.

Using the projector under such conditions will result in fire, electric shocks or components deterioration. Components deterioration (such as ceiling mount brackets) may cause the projector which is mounted on the ceiling to fall down.

#### Do not install this projector in a place which is not strong enough to take the full weight of the projector or on top of a surface which is sloped or unstable.

Failure to observe this will cause projector to fall down or tip over the projector, and severe injury or damage could result.

#### Do not place another projector or other heavy objects on top of the projector.

Failure to observe this will cause the projector to become unbalanced and fall, which could result in damage or injury. The projector will be damaged or deformed.

#### Installation work (such as ceiling mount bracket) should only be carried out by a qualified technician.

If installation is not carried out and secured correctly it can cause injury or accidents, such as electric shocks.

- Do not use anything other than an authorized ceiling mount bracket.
- Be sure to use the wire provided with the projector mount bracket for ceiling mount as an extra safety measure to prevent the projector from falling down (Install in a different location to the ceiling mount bracket).

#### Do not cover the intake port or the air exhaust port.

Doing so will cause the projector to overheat, which can cause fire or damage to the projector.

- Do not place the projector in narrow, badly ventilated places.
- Do not place the projector on cloth or papers, as these materials could be drawn into the air intake port.

#### WARNING:

#### Do not place your hands or other objects close to the air exhaust port.

Doing so will cause burns or damage your hands or other objects.

• Heated air comes out of the air exhaust port. Do not place your hands or face, or objects which cannot withstand heat close to this port.

#### **Do not look and place your skin into the lights emitted from the lens while the projector is being used.** Doing so can cause burns or loss of sight.

- Strong light is emitted from the projector's lens. Do not look or place your hands directly into this light.
- Be especially careful not to let young children look into the lens. In addition, turn off the power and disconnect the power plug when you are away from the projector.

#### Do not insert any foreign objects into the projector.

Doing so will cause fire or electric shocks.

• Do not insert any metal objects or flammable objects into the projector or drop them onto the projector.

#### Never attempt to remodel or disassemble the projector.

High voltages can cause fire or electric shocks.

• For any inspection, adjustment and repair work, please contact an Authorized Service Center.

#### Do not project an image with the lens cap attached.

Doing so can cause fire.

# Do not allow metal objects, flammable objects, or liquids to enter inside of the projector. Do not allow the projector to get wet.

Doing so may cause short circuits or overheating, and result in fire, electric shock, or malfunction of the projector.

- Do not place containers of liquid or metal objects near the projector.
- If liquid enters inside of the projector, consult your dealer.
- Particular attention must be paid to children.

#### Use the ceiling mount bracket specified by Panasonic.

Defects in the ceiling mount bracket will result in falling accidents.

• Attach the supplied safety cable to the ceiling mount bracket to prevent the projector from falling down.

#### ACCESSORIES

#### Do not use or handle the batteries improperly, and refer to the following.

Failure to observe this will cause burns, batteries to leak, overheat, explode or catch fire.

- Use AAA/R03 or AAA/LR03 batteries.
- Do not use unspecified batteries.
- Do not disassemble dry cell batteries.
- Do not heat the batteries or place them into water or fire.
- Do not allow the + and terminals of the batteries to come into contact with metallic objects such as necklaces or hairpins.
- Do not store or carry batteries together with metallic objects.
- Store the batteries in a plastic bag and keep them away from metallic objects.
- Make sure the polarities (+ and -) are correct when inserting the batteries.
- Do not use a new battery together with an old battery or mix different types of batteries.
- Do not use batteries with the outer cover peeling away or removed.
- Remove the empty batteries from the remote control at once.
- Insulate the battery using tape or something similar before disposal.

#### Do not allow children to reach the batteries (AAA/R03 or AAA/LR03 type).

- The battery can cause personal injury if swallowed.
- If swallowed, seek medical advice immediately.

#### If the battery fluid leaks, do not touch it with bare hands, and take the following measures if necessary.

- Battery fluid on your skin or clothing could result in skin inflammation or injury.
- Rinse with clean water and seek medical advice immediately.
- Battery fluid coming in contact with your eyes could result in loss of sight.
   In this case, do not rub your eyes. Rinse with clean water and seek medical advice immediately.

If the lamp breaks, it could cause injury.

#### Lamp replacement

The lamp has high internal pressure. If improperly handled, an explosion and severe injury or accidents will result.

- The lamp can easily explode if struck against hard objects or dropped.
- Before replacing the lamp, be sure to disconnect the power plug from the wall outlet. Electric shocks or explosions can result if this is not done.
- When replacing the lamp, turn the power off and allow the lamp it to cool for at least 1 hour before handling it otherwise it can cause burns.

#### Do not allow infants or pets to touch the remote control unit.

• Keep the remote control unit out of the reach of infants and pets after using it.

#### Do not use the supplied power cord with devices other than this projector.

• Using the supplied power cord with devices other than this projector may cause short circuits or overheating, and result in electric shock or fire.

Remove the depleted batteries from the remote control promptly.

• Leaving them in the unit may result in fluid leakage, overheating, or explosion of the batteries.

#### CAUTION:

#### POWER

When disconnecting the power cord, be sure to hold the power plug and power connector. If the power cord itself is pulled, the lead will become damaged, and fire, short-circuits or serious electric

shocks will result.

When not using the projector for an extended period of time, disconnect the power plug from the wall outlet and remove the batteries from the remote control.

**Disconnect the power plug from the wall outlet before carrying out any cleaning and replacing the unit.** Electric shocks can result if this is not done.

#### ON USE/INSTALLATION

#### Do not place heavy objects on top of the projector.

Failure to observe this will cause the projector to become unbalanced and fall, which could result in damage or injury. The projector will be damaged or deformed.

#### Do not put your weight on this projector.

You could fall or the projector could break, and injury will result.

• Be especially careful not to let young children stand or sit on the projector.

#### Do not place the projector in extremely hot locations.

Doing so will cause the outer casing or internal components to deteriorate, or result in fire.

• Take particular care in locations exposed to direct sunlight or near stoves.

#### Always disconnect all cables before moving the projector.

Moving the projector with cables still attached can damage the cables, which will cause fire or electric shocks to occur.

#### Never plug headphones and earphones into VARIABLE AUDIO OUT jack.

Excessive sound pressure from earphones and headphones can cause hearing loss.

#### ACCESSORIES

#### Do not use the old lamp unit.

If used it could cause lamp explosion.

# If the lamp has broken, ventilate the room immediately. Do not touch or bring your face close to the broken pieces.

Failure to observe this will cause the user to absorb the gas which was released when the lamp broke and which contains nearly the same amount of mercury as fluorescent lamps, and the broken pieces will cause injury.

- If you believe that you have absorbed the gas or that the gas has got into your eyes or mouth, seek medical advice immediately.
- Ask your dealer about replacing the lamp unit and check the inside of the projector.






#### BRASIL

Após o uso, as pilhas e /ou baterias deverão ser entregues ao estabelecimento comercial ou rede de assistência técnica autorizada.

Cobrir os terminais positivo (+) e negativo (-) com uma fita isolante adesiva, antes de depositar numa caixa destinada para o recolhimento. O contato entre partes metálicas pode causar vazamentos, gerar calor, romper a blindagem e produzir fogo.(Fig. 1)

#### Fig. 1 Como isolar os terminais




Não desmonte, não remova o invólucro, nem amasse a bateria. O gás liberado pela bateria pode irritar a garganta, danificar o lacre do invólucro ou o vazamento provocar calor, ruptura da blindagem e produzir fogo devido ao curto circuito dos terminais.Não incinere nem aqueça as baterias, elas não podem ficar expostas a temperaturas superiores a 100 °C (212 °F). O gás liberado pela bateria pode irritar a garganta, danificar o lacre do invólucro ou o vazamento provocar calor, ruptura da blindagem e produzir fogo devido ao curto circuito dos terminais.

Evite o contato com o liquido que vazar das baterias. Caso isto ocorra, lave bem a parte afetada com bastante água. Caso haja irritação, consulte um médico.

#### Remoção das baterias

#### 1. Pressione a guia e levante a tampa.

2. Remova as baterias.

#### Wired LAN Function

This function allows you to project an image on a computer as well as operate and manage the projector via network.

#### **Useful Functions for Presentations**

- The digital zoom function allows you to focus on the crucial information during a presentation.
- The MIC function and 10 W audio output allows you to make a presentation without any external audio equipment.



# Chapter 1 **Preparation**

This chapter describes things you need to know or check before using the projector.

## Precautions for use

#### **Cautions when transporting**

- When transporting the projector, hold it securely by its bottom and avoid excessive vibration and impacts. Doing so may damage the internal parts and result in malfunctions.
- Do not transport the projector with the adjustable feet extended. Doing so may damage the adjustable feet.

#### **Cautions when installing**

#### ■ Do not set up the projector outdoors.

The projector is designed for indoor use only.

#### Do not use under the following conditions.

- Places where vibration and impacts occur such as in a car or vehicle: Doing so may damage the internal parts and result in malfunctions.
- Near the exhaust of an air conditioner or near lights (studio lamps, etc.) where temperature changes greatly (Operating environment ⇒page 111): Doing so may shorten the life of the lamp or result in deformation of the outer case and malfunctions.
- Near high-voltage power lines or near motors: Doing so may interfere with the operation of the projector.

#### Be sure to ask a specialized technician when installing the product to a ceiling.

This requires an optional ceiling mount bracket.





Avoid use in locations where exhaust or streams of air from projector, other devices and air conditioners flow between the projector and the screen.

• The lens of projector is affected by the heat from the luminous source. Because of this, the focusing may not be stable right after the power is turned on. Focusing is stabled after projecting image for 30 minutes and longer.

#### ■ Do not touch the surface of the projector lens with your bare hands.

If the surface of the projection lens becomes dirty from fingerprints or anything else, this will be magnified and projected onto the screen.

Attach the supplied lens cap to the projection lens when you do not use the projector.

#### LCD Panel

The display unit of this projector comprises three LCD panels. Although an LCD panel is a product of high-precision technology, some of the pixels on the projected image may be missing or constantly lit. Please note that this is not a malfunction.

Displaying a still image for a longer time may result in an after-image on the LCD panels. If this happens, display the all white screen in the test pattern for an hour or more.

#### Optical components

Operating the projector in an environment with high temperature or heavy exposure to dust or tobacco smoke will reduce the service life of the optical components, such as the LCD panel and polarizing plate, and may necessitate their replacement within less than one year of use. For details, consult your dealer.


#### Lamp

The luminous source of the projector is a mercury lamp with high internal pressure.

- A high pressure mercury lamp has following characteristics.
- The brightness of the lamp will decrease by duration of usage.
- The lamp may burst with sound or shorten life by shock or chipping.
- The life of the lamp varies greatly depending on individual specificities and usage conditions. In particular, continuous use over 12 hours and frequent on/off switching of the power greatly deteriorate the lamp and affect the lamp life.
- In rare cases, the lamp burst shortly after the projection.
- The risk of bursting increases when the lamp is used beyond its replacement cycle. Make sure to replace the lamp unit consistently. ("When to replace the lamp unit" (➡page 97))
- If the lamp bursts, gas contained inside of the lamp is released in a form of smoke.
- It is recommended to store replacement lamps for contingency.
- It is recommended to have authorized engineer or your dealer replace the lamp unit.

## Using the remote control

#### Inserting and Removing batteries

• When removing the batteries, perform the steps in reverse order.

#### Setting Remote control ID numbers

When you use the system with multiple projectors, you can operate all the projectors simultaneously or each projector individually using single remote control, if unique ID number is assigned to each projector.

After setting the ID number of the projector, set the same ID number to the remote control.

The factory default ID number of the projector is set to [ALL]. When using a single projector, press the <ID ALL> button on the remote control. Also, you can control a projector by pressing the <ID ALL> button on the remote control even if you do not know the projector ID.

#### How to set

- 1) Press the <ID SET> button on the remote control.
- Within five seconds, press the one digit ID number set on the projector using the number (<1> <6>) buttons.

• If you press the <ID ALL> button, you can control the projectors regardless of the ID number setting of the projector.

#### Attention

- Since the ID number of the remote control can be set without the projector, do not press the <ID SET> button on the remote control carelessly. If the <ID SET> button is pressed and no number (<1> <6>) buttons are pressed within five seconds, the ID number returns to its original value before the <ID SET> button was pressed.
- The ID number set on the remote control will be stored unless it is set again. However, it will be erased if the remote control is left with dead batteries. Set the same ID number again when the batteries are replaced.





# Setting up

#### Installation mode

There are four ways to set up the projector. Set the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu  $\rightarrow$  [PROJECTION METHOD] ( $\Rightarrow$  page 67) depending on the installation location.





#### Parts for ceiling mount (Optional)

You can install the projector on the ceiling by using the optional ceiling mount bracket (ET-PKV100H: for high ceiling, ET-PKV100S: for low ceiling), and the optional projector mount bracket ET-PKV101B.


- Use only the ceiling mount brackets specified for this projector.
- Refer to the Installation Instructions for the ceiling mount bracket when you install the bracket and the projector.

#### Attention

• To ensure projector performance and security, installation of the ceiling mount bracket must be carried by your dealer or a qualified technician.

#### Screen size and throw distance

Refer to the screen size and projection distances to install the projector. Image size and image position can be adjusted in accordance with the screen size and screen position.



#### Adjusting adjustable feet

Lift the front of the projector and press the feet lock latches on both side of the projector.

Release the feet lock latches to lock the adjustable feet and rotate the adjustable feet to a proper height and tilt. You can turn the adjustable feet to extend them. You can turn them in the opposite direction to contract them. (You can adjust the projection angle vertically.)



#### Attention

- Heated air comes out of the air exhaust port while the lamp is lit. Do not touch the air exhaust port directly when you adjust the adjustable feet.
- If keystone distortion occurs on the projected image, perform [KEYSTONE] from the [POSITION] menu. (➡page 54)

#### Note

• Screw up the adjustable feet, and an audible click will be heard as the limit.

# Connecting

#### Before connecting to the projector

- Before connecting, carefully read the operating instructions for the external device to be connected.
- Turn off the power switch of the devices before connecting cables.
- Take note of the following points before connecting the cables. Failure to do so may result in malfunctions.
- When connecting a cable to a device connected to the projector or the projector itself, touch any nearby metallic objects to eliminate static electricity from your body before performing work.
- Do not use unnecessarily long cables to connect to a device connected to the projector or to the projector body. The longer the cable, the more it is susceptible to noise. Since using a cable while it is wound makes it act like an antenna, it is more susceptible to noise.
- When connecting cables, connect GND first, then insert the connecting terminal of the connecting device in a straight manner.
- If any connection cable is not supplied with the device, or if no optional cable is available for connection of the device, prepare a necessary system connection cable to suit the device.
- Video signals containing too much jitter may cause the images on the screen to randomly wobble or wafture. In this case, a time base corrector (TBC) must be connected.
- The projector accepts VIDEO signals, S-VIDEO signals, YC<sub>B</sub>C<sub>R</sub>/YP<sub>B</sub>P<sub>R</sub> signals and analog RGB signals (synchronous signals are TTL level), and digital signal.
- Some computer models are not compatible with the projector.
- When using long cables to connect with each of equipment to the projector, there is a possibility that the image will not be output correctly unless a compensator is used.
- For details on what video signals the projector supports, see "List of compatible signals". (➡pages 108-109)




#### Attention

- Always use one of the following when connecting a VCR.
  - A VCR with built-in time base corrector (TBC).
- A time base corrector (TBC) between the projector and the VCR.
- If nonstandard burst signals are connected, the image may be distorted. In such case, connect the time base corrector (TBC) between the projector and the external devices.

#### Note

- For an HDMI cable, use an HDMI High Speed cable that conforms to HDMI standards. If a cable that does not conform to HDMI standards is used, images may be interrupted or may not be displayed.
- This projector does not support the Viera link (HDMI).
- For the specifications of the RGB signals that can be applied from the PC, refer to "List of compatible signals". (Ppages 108-109)

#### **Connecting example : Computers**




#### Attention

• When connecting the projector to a computer or an external device, use the power cord supplied with each device and commercially available shielded cables.

#### Note

 If you operate the projector using the computer with the resume feature (last memory), you may have to reset the resume feature to operate the projector.

#### **Connecting example : Audio**



#### Note

- If the [AUDIO IN SELECT] settings are incorrect, the projector may have malfunctions such as the absence of audio.
- When the <VARIABLE AUDIO OUT> terminal is connected with cable, the sound will not be output from the built-in speaker.

# Chapter 3 Basic Operations

This chapter describes basic operations to start with.


# Powering on/off

#### Connecting the power cord

Make sure that the supplied power cord is securely fixed to the projector body to prevent it from being removed easily. For details of power cord handling, refer to "Read this first!" (>page 5).


#### Attaching

 Check the shapes of the <AC IN> terminal on the back of the projector body and the power cord connector and insert the plug completely in the correct direction (until you hear the side tabs click in place).




#### Removing

- 1) Turn off the projector, and then remove the AC power cord from the electrical outlet.
- Remove the AC power cord connector from the <AC IN> terminal on the projector while pressing the tabs on its sides.



#### ON(G)/STANDBY(R) indicator

The ON(G)/STANDBY(R) indicator informs you the status of the power. Confirm the status of the ON(G)/STANDBY(R) indicator before operating the projector.



#### Powering On the Projector

Before switching on the projector, make sure all the other devices are correctly connected (
pages 31-32) and remove the lens cap.



- 1) Connect the power cord to the projector body.
- 2) Connect the power plug to an outlet.
  - The power indicator <ON(G)/STANDBY(R)> lights or blinks, and the projector will enter the standby mode.
- 3) Press the  $\langle \phi / | >$  button on the control panel or on the remote control.
  - The power indicator <ON(G)/STANDBY(R)> lights in green and the image is soon projected on the screen.

#### Attention


• Using the projector while the lens cap is attached may cause the device to heat up and result in a fire.

#### Note

If the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [ECO MANAGEMENT]→[STANDBY MODE] is set to [ECO], it may take approx. 10 seconds longer before the projector starts projecting after the power is turned on, compared with when [NORMAL] is set.

#### Making adjustments and selections

It is recommended that images are projected continuously for at least 30 minutes before the focus is adjusted.




- 1) Adjust the focus of the image roughly. (⇒page 38)
- 2) Change the settings of the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu  $\rightarrow$  [PROJECTION METHOD] depending on the installation mode. ( $\Rightarrow$  page 25)
  - Refer to "Navigating through the menu" (➡ page 45) for the operation of the menu screen.
- 3) Press the <INPUT SELECT> button on the control panel or the input selection (<COMPUTER 1>, <COMPUTER 2>, <HDMI>, <VIDEO>,<S-VIDEO>) buttons to select the input signal.
- 4) Adjust the front, back and sideway tilt of the projector with the adjustable feet. (⇒page 28)
- 5) If the input signal is an analog RGB signal, press the <AUTO SETUP> button.
- 6) Adjust the size of the image to match the screen with the zoom ring.
- 7) Adjust the focus with the focus ring.

#### Note

When the projector is switched on for the first time after purchase as well as when the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [INITIALIZE ALL] is executed, the initial setting screen is displayed after projection starts. Refer to "Start-up display" for details. (➡ page 19)



### **Powering Off the Projector**



- 1) Press the  $\langle \phi / | >$  button on the control panel or on the remote control.
  - The following message appears.

Press ◀▶ to select [OK], and press the <ENTER> button.
 OR

#### Press the $\langle 0/| >$ button on the control panel or on the remote control again.

Projection of the image will stop, and the power indicator <ON(G)/STANDBY(R)> lights in orange. (The fan keeps running.)

#### 3) Wait until the <ON(G)/STANDBY(R)> indicator lights/blinks in red/green.

• The projector enters standby mode when the power indicator <ON(G)/STANDBY(R)> lights/blinks in red/green.

#### Note

- Do not put the projector in a case before the projector is cooled enough.
- While the <ON(G)/STANDBY(R)> indicator is lighting in orange, the lamp is being cooled down and the projector cannot be turned on. Wait until the <ON(G)/STANDBY(R)> indicator stops lighting/blinking in red to turn on the projector again.

#### **Direct Power Off function**

You can disconnect the power cord from the wall outlet or turn off the breaker even during projection.

#### Note

• When using the Direct Power Off function, you cannot restart the projector immediately after the power is disconnected. The lamp remains high temperature and needs to be cooled, so it sometimes takes longer time than usual for the lamp to light up again.

## Projecting

Check the connections of the peripheral devices and connection of the power cord (⇒pages 29-34) and switch on the power (⇒page 36) to start the projector. Select the image and adjust the state of the image.

## Selecting the input signal

Select an input signal.

- 1) Press <COMPUTER 1>, <COMPUTER 2>, <HDMI>, <VIDEO>, or <S-VIDEO> button on the remote control or <INPUT SELECT> button on the control panel.
  - The image of the signal being input in the selected terminal is projected.
  - You can check the input source through [DETAILED] / [SIMPLE] under the [DISPLAY OPTION] → [ON-SCREEN DISPLAY] → [INPUT GUIDE] menu.
  - You can also select the input source by pressing ▲▼◀▶ on the [DETAILED] screen.

If there is no signal input ([COMPUTER 1], [COMPUTER 2] or [HDMI]), this screen will be displayed. Check the output settings of your computer.

#### Attention

- Images may not be projected properly depending on the connected device and DVD, video tape, etc. to be played. Set the [PICTURE] menu → [RGB/YCBCR] or [RGB/YPBPR] (→ page 53).
- Check the aspect ratio of the screen and the image and select the optimum aspect ratio under the [POSITION] menu (+page 57).

### How to adjust the state of the image


If the projected image or the position is not correct when the positioning of the projector and the screen is correctly installed, adjust the focus and zoom.

#### 1) Adjust the projection angle.

- Install the projector on a flat surface and parallel to the screen so that the projected screen is rectangular.
- If the screen is tilted downward, extend the adjustable feet and adjust the projection screen so that the projected screen is rectangular.
- For details, see "Adjusting adjustable feet" (>page 28).

#### 2) Adjust the zoom and the focus.

- Rotate the zoom ring to zoom in and out the image.
- Rotate the focus ring to adjust the focus of the projected image.



#### Note

- It is recommended that the images are projected continuously for at least 30 minutes before the focus is adjusted.
- If you adjust the focus, you may need to adjust the size of the image by turning the zoom ring again.
- If keystone distortion occurs, see the [POSITION] menu  $\rightarrow$  [KEYSTONE] ( $\Rightarrow$  page 54).

## **Using the AUTO SETUP function**

The automatic setup function can be used to automatically adjust the resolution, clock phase, and image position when analog RGB signals consisting of bitmap images such as computer signals are being input. Supplying images with bright white borders at the edges and high-contrast black and white characters is recommended when the system is in automatic adjustment mode.

Avoid supplying images that include halftones or gradation, such as photographs and computer graphics.



#### 1) Press the <AUTO SETUP> button on the remote control.

#### Note

- The [CLOCK PHASE] may shift even if it has completed without any incident. In such cases, adjust the [POSITION] menu → [CLOCK PHASE] (⇒ page 56).
- Automatic adjustment may not work depending on the the model of the computer and the input signal.
- Images may be disrupted for a few seconds during automatic adjustment, but it is not a malfunction.
- If you press any button on the remote control during the automatic adjustment, the automatic adjustment will be canceled.
- If the automatic setup function is used while moving images are being input, the adjustment may not be performed properly even for an RGB signal that can use automatic setup.

#### Using the KEYSTONE button

You can correct the trapezoidal distortion that occurs when the projector is installed tilted or when the screen is tilted.



  - The [KEYSTONE] or [CORNER CORRECTION] individual adjustment screen is displayed.

#### Note

For more details, refer to the [POSITION] menu → [KEYSTONE] (→ page 54).

### Switching the input signal

You can switch the input signals to project.

- 1) Press the <COMPUTER 1>,<COMPUTER 2>, <HDMI>, <VIDEO> or <S-VIDEO> button on the remote control.
  - This operation can be also performed using the <INPUT SELECT> button on the control panel.

<computer 1=""></computer>	Switch to Computer 1 input.
<computer 2=""></computer>	Switch to Computer 2 input.
<hdmi></hdmi>	Switch to HDMI input.
<video></video>	Switch to Video input.

#### **Using the FUNCTION button**

Some operations in the menu can be assigned to the <FUNCTION> button on the remote control so that it can be used as an easy shortcut button.

#### FUNCTION

1) Press the <FUNCTION> button on the remote control.

#### To assign functions to the <FUNCTION> button

- 1) Press the <MENU> button on the control panel or the remote control to display the menu items (main menu, sub menu, or details menu) you want to assign.
  - Refer to "Navigating through the menu" (→ page 45) for the operation of the on-screen menu.
- 2) Press and hold the <FUNCTION> button for 3 seconds or more.

#### Note

- After settings have been completed, the assigned menu item (main menu, sub-menu, or details menu) will be displayed in [ASSIGNED FUNCTION] of the operation guide under the menu.
- Perform the [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [FUNCTION BUTTON] (⇒ page 70) when deallocating functions.

#### Using the FREEZE function

You can freeze the projected image and stop the sound temporarily, regardless of the playing condition of the external device.



## button

- 1) Press the <FREEZE> button on the remote control.
  - The video is paused and the audio is muted. [FREEZE] is displayed on the lower left of the screen during FREEZE.
- 2) Press the <FREEZE> button again.
  - The video playback resumes and the audio is unmuted.

#### Note

- When no signal inputs, [KEY NOT APPLICABLE] message will appear.
- When [MIC] is set to [ON], the audio of MIC can be output even during FREEZE.

### Using the AV MUTE function

If the projector is not used for a certain period of time during the meeting intermission, for example, it is possible to turn off the audio and video temporarily.



1) Press the <AV MUTE> button on the remote control.

• The audio and video turn off.

- 2) Press the <AV MUTE> button again.
  - The audio and video turn on.

#### Note

• When [MIC] is set to [ON], the audio of MIC can be output even during AV MUTE.

## **Using the P-TIMER function**

You can operate the P-TIMER function.

When you press the <P-TIMER> button on the remote control, the projector displays either a remaining time or a elapsed time.



#### 1) Press the <P-TIMER> button on the remote control.

- The count time starts.
- Remaining time or elapsed time is displayed in the lower right corner of the projected image.

#### 2) Press the <P-TIMER> button again.

• The count time stops.

#### 3) Press the <P-TIMER> button again.


• You can restart the count.

#### Note

- Pressing the button for at least 3 seconds to release the P-TIMER function.
- For details, please refer to the [DISPLAY OPTION] menu → [P-TIMER] (⇒page 64).

#### Using the DIGITAL ZOOM function

(Only for still image-based computer (RGB) and still image-based HDMI signals input) You can enlarge the center area. You can also change the location of the area to be enlarged.



#### 1) Press the <D.ZOOM +> or <D.ZOOM -> button on the remote control.

- The moving screen is displayed.
- The [DIGITAL ZOOM] individual adjustment screen is displayed when executing the menu operation. For details, refer to [DISPLAY OPTION] → [OTHER FUNCTIONS] (→page 65).
- Pressing the <RETURN> button cancels the function.







# Chapter 4 Settings

This chapter describes the settings and adjustments you can make using the on-screen menu.

## **Menu Navigation**

The on-screen menu (Menu) is used to perform various settings and adjustments of the projector.

#### Navigating through the menu

#### Operating procedure



button

- 1) Press the <MENU> button on the remote control or the control panel.
  - The main menu screen appears.

2) Press  $\blacktriangle \lor$  to select an item from the main menu.


• The selected item is highlighted in yellow.

• For some items, press **(**) to display an individual adjustment screen with a bar scale as shown below.

#### Note

- Pressing the <MENU> button or <RETURN> button while the menu screen is displayed returns to the previous menu.
- Some items may not be adjusted or used for certain signal formats to be input to the projector. The menu items that cannot be adjusted or used are shown in gray characters, and they cannot be selected. [DIGITAL CINEMA REALITY] and [FRAME LOCK] may not be displayed depending on the input signal.
- Some items can be adjusted even if signals are not input.
- Individual adjustment screen is cleared automatically if no operation is performed for approximately five seconds.
- For menu items, refer to "Main menu" (>page 46) and "Sub-menu" (>page 47).

### Resetting adjustment values to the factory default

If the <DEFAULT> button on the remote control is pressed, the values adjusted in the menu items are restored to the factory default settings.

#### 1) Press the <DEFAULT> button on the remote control.

#### Note

- You cannot reset all the settings to the factory default at a time.
- To reset all the settings adjusted in the sub-menu item to the factory default one at a time, execute [PROJECTOR SETUP] menu → [INITIALIZE ALL] (→ page 72).
- Some items cannot be reset by pressing the <DEFAULT> button. Adjust each item manually.


# LAMP and WARNING Indicators

# Managing the indicated problems

If a problem should occur inside the projector, the <ON(G)/STANDBY(R)>, <LAMP> and/or <WARNING> indicators will inform you. Manage the indicated problems as follow.

#### Attention

 Before you take a remedial measure, follow the procedure of switching the power off indicated in "Powering Off the projector". (>page 37)

# Replacement

# Before performing maintenance/replacement

- When you perform maintenance or replacement of the parts, make sure to turn off the power and disconnect the power plug from the wall outlet. (➡ pages 34, 37)
- Be sure to observe the procedure "Powering Off the projector" (➡ page 37) when performing power supply operation.

### Maintenance

#### **Outer Case**

Wipe off dirt and dust using a soft dry cloth.

- If the dirt is persistent, soak the cloth with water and wring it thoroughly before wiping. Dry off the projector with a dry cloth.
- Do not use benzene, thinner, or rubbing alcohol, other solvents, household cleaners. Using them may cause deterioration of the outer case.
- When using chemical treated dusters, follow its instruction.

#### Front glass surface of the lens

Wipe off the dirt and dust off the front surface of the lens with soft clean cloth.

- Do not use a cloth that has an abrasive surface or a cloth that is moist, oily, or covered with dust.
- Do not use excessive force when wiping the lens as it is fragile.

#### Attention

The lens is made of glass. Impacts or excessive force when wiping may scratch its surface.
 Please handle with care.

# Replacing the unit


#### Air filter unit

The air filter prevents dust from accumulating on the optical elements inside the projector. Should the air filter become clogged with dust particles, it will reduce cooling fans' effectiveness and may result in internal heat buildup and adversely affect the life of the projector.

If the air filter unit become clogged, it will result in internal heat buildup, the power of the projector may be turned off for safety. If a warning message appears on the screen, replace the air filter immediately.

Consult your dealer to purchase a replacement air filter unit (ET-RFV300).

#### Removing the air filter unit




#### 1) Remove the air filter cover. (Fig.1)

• Open the air filter cover in the direction of the arrow and remove it.

#### 2) Remove the air filter unit.

- Hold the tab of the air filter unit and pull out in the direction of the arrow. (Fig.2)
- After removing the air filter unit, remove foreign objects and dust from the air filter compartment and the projector's air intake port if there are any.

#### Attaching the air filter unit



#### 1) Attach the unused air filter unit to the projector.

- Hold the air filter unit that the tab is in up-left side in the figure, put the right side in the figure first, and press the tab side until make a click sound.
- Do not press any other part of the air filter unit except the frame during installation.

#### 2) Install the air filter cover.

- Perform Step 1) in "Removing the air filter unit" ( page 95) in the reverse order .
- Make sure that the air filter cover is closed tightly.

#### Resetting the filter counter.

Be sure to reset the filter counter after replacing the air filter unit.

- 1) Connect the power plug, press the  $\langle 0/| \rangle$  button on the control panel or on the remote control.
- 2) Press the <MENU> button to display the main menu, then press ▲▼ to select [PROJECTOR SETUP].
- 3) Press the <ENTER> button, press ▲▼ to select [FILTER COUNTER].
- 4) Press the <ENTER> button, press ▲▼ to select [FILTER COUNTER RESET].
- 5) Press the <ENTER> button.
  - [FILTER COUNTER RESET] confirmation is displayed.
- 6) Press **♦** to select [OK], then press the <ENTER> button.
  - The filter usage time is 0 after reset.

#### Attention

- Turn off the power before you replace the air filter unit.
- When attaching the air filter unit, make sure that the projector is stable, and work in an environment that is safe, even in the event of the air filter unit dropping.
- Make sure that the air filter unit is properly attached before using the projector. If it is not attached, the projector will suck in dirt and dust causing a malfunction.
- Do not put anything into the air vents. Doing so may result in malfunction of the projector.
- The air filter unit to be replaced should be an unused product.
- After replacing the air filter, reset the filter counter. Otherwise, "FILTER COUNTER has reached the set time." will appear on screen.

#### Note

• The replacement cycle of the air filter unit varies greatly depending on the usage environment.

#### Lamp unit

The lamp unit is a consumable component.

It is recommended to ask an authorized engineer to replace the lamp unit. Contact your dealer. Consult your dealer to purchase a replacement lamp unit (ET-LAV300).

# Warning

**Do not replace the lamp unit when it is hot. (Wait at least 1 hour after use.)** The inside of the cover can become very hot, take care to avoid burn injuries.

#### Notes on the replacement of the lamp unit

- The luminous source of the lamp is made of glass and may burst if you hit it against a hard surface or drop it. Please handle with care.
- A Phillips screwdriver is required for replacement of the lamp unit.
- When replacing the lamp unit, be sure to hold it by the handle.
- When replacing the lamp because it has stopped illuminating, there is a possibility that the lamp may be broken. If replacing
  the lamp of a projector which has been installed on the ceiling, you should always assume that the lamp is broken, and you
  should stand to the side of the lamp cover, not underneath it. Remove the lamp cover gently. Small pieces of glass may fall
  out when the lamp cover is opened. If pieces of glass get into your eyes or mouth, seek medical advice immediately.
- The lamp may be ruptured. Care should be taken not to scatter pieces of the broken lamp glass when replacing the lamp unit. Pieces of the broken lamp may fall from the lamp unit especially when the projector is mounted on the ceiling, so when replacing the lamp unit do not stand directly underneath it or position your face close to it.
- The lamp contains mercury. Consult your local municipality or your dealer about correct disposal of used lamp units.

#### Attention

 Panasonic takes no responsibility for any damage or malfunction of the product resulting from use of lamp units which are not manufactured by Panasonic. Use only specified lamp units.

#### Note

• The model numbers of accessories and optional accessories are subject to change without prior notice.

#### When to replace the lamp unit

The lamp unit is a consumable component. Since its brightness gradually decreases over time, it is necessary to replace the lamp unit regularly. The estimated duration before replacement is 4 000 hours, but the lamp may go off before 4 000 hours has elapsed depending on individual lamp characteristics, usage conditions, and the installation environment. It is recommended that the Replacement lamp unit be prepared earlier.

If you continue to use the lamp unit after 4 000 hours has elapsed, the lamp turns off automatically after approximately 10 minutes, as it will cause malfunction of the projector.



#### Replacing the Lamp unit

#### Attention

- When the projector is mounted on a ceiling, do not work with your face close to the projector.
- Attach the lamp unit and the lamp cover securely.
- When you experience difficulty in installing the lamp, remove it and try again. If you use force to install the lamp, the connector may be damaged.
- Do not loosen other than designated screws.



- 1) Turn off the Power by following the procedure in "Powering Off the Projector" (➡ page 37). Remove the AC power plug from the wall outlet. Wait at least 1 hour and make sure the lamp unit and surroundings are cool.
- Remove the lamp cover.
   Use a Phillips screwdriver to loosen the lamp cover fixing screw (×1) and remove the lamp cover.

• Remove the lamp cover by pulling it slowly toward the direction of the arrow.

- Remove the lamp unit.
   Use a Phillips screwdriver to loosen the three lamp unit fixing screws (×3) until the screws turn freely.
   Hold the used lamp unit by its handles, and pull it gently from the projector.
- 4) Attach the unused lamp unit. Insert the new lamp unit in correct direction. Tighten the three lamp unit fixing screws (×3) securely with a Phillips screwdriver.
- Attach the lamp cover. Attach the lamp cover, and tighten the lamp cover fixing screw (×1) securely with a Phillips screwdriver.

• Attach the lamp cover by pushing it slowly opposite the direction of the arrow.





# PJLink protocol

The network function of the projector supports PJLink class 1, and the PJLink protocol can be used to perform projector setting and projector status query operations from a computer.






#### **Basic format**

#### Attention


- If a command is transmitted after the lamp starts illuminating, there may be a delay in response or the command may not be executed. Try sending or receiving any command after 60 seconds.
- When transmitting multiple commands, be sure to wait until 0.5 seconds has elapsed after receiving the response from the
  projector before sending the next command. When transmitting a command which does not need a parameter, a colon (:) is
  not necessary.

#### Note

- If a command cannot be executed, the "ER401" response is sent from the projector to the computer.
- If an invalid parameter is sent, the "ER402" response is sent from the projector to the computer.
- ID transmission in RS-232C supports ZZ (ALL) and 01 to 64, as well as 0A to 0Z groups.
- If a command is sent with a specified ID, a response will be sent to the computer only in the following cases.
  - It matches the projector ID.
- [PROJECTOR ID] (
  page 66) is set to [ALL].
- STX and ETX are character codes. STX shown in hexadecimal is 02, and ETX shown in hexadecimal is 03.




