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

Contact your dealer immediately if any items are missing, appear damaged, or if the unit does not work.


Caution:

Avoid using the projector in dusty environment.

Leave the power cable plugged in (for 5-10 minutes) until the projector cools down to room temperature before placing the projector inside the soft case. Placing the projector into the case right after switching off the power could cause the projector to break down. Be sure to attach the lens cap and place the projector into the soft case.



Grill openings on the projector allow for good air circulation, which keeps the projector lamp cool. Do not obstruct any of the grill openings.



Top view—OSD buttons and LEDs







Remote Control Parts



Important:

Avoid using the projector when bright fluorescent lighting turned on. Certain high-frequency fluorescent lights can disrupt remote control operation.

Be sure nothing obstructs the path between the remote control and the projector. If the path between remote and projector is obstructed, you can bounce the remote signal off certain reflective surfaces such as projector screens.



Remote Control Operating Range

The remote control uses infrared transmission to control the projector. It is not necessary to point the remote directly at the projector. Provided you are not holding the remote perpendicular to the sides or the rear of the projector, the remote functions within a radius of about 7 meters (23 feet) and 30 degrees above or below the projector level. If the projector does not respond to the remote control, move a little closer towards the projector.

Projector and Remote Control Buttons

The projector can be operated using the remote control or the buttons on the top of the projector. All operations can be carried out with the remote control, however the buttons on the projector are limited in use. The following illustration shows the corresponding buttons on the remote control and on the projector.




Some buttons on the projector have two functions. For example, item 5/12 on the projector functions both as the volume down button and as the left cursor key in OSD menus.



Inserting the Remote Control Batteries


 Remove the battery compartment cover by sliding the cover in the direction of the arrow



2. Insert the supplied batteries taking note of the polarity (+/-) as shown here.



3. Replace the cover.


Only use AAA batteries.(Alkaline battery is better).

Dispose of used batteries according to local ordinance regulations.

Remove the batteries when not using the projector for prolonged periods.

Connecting Input Devices

A PC or notebook computer as well as video devices can be connected to the projector at the same time. Video devices include DVD, VCD, and VHS players, as well as movie camcorders and digital still cameras.

Starting and Shutting Down the Projector


- 1. Connect the power cord to the projector (A). Connect the other end to a wall outlet.


 Turn on the power switch (B).

 The Power LED and Lamp-ready LED turn on.
- **2.** Remove the lens cover
- 3. Turn on the connected devices.
- 4. Ensure the Lamp-ready LED is on a steady (not flashing) orange and then press the **Power** button to turn on the projector.

The projector splash screen displays and connected devices are detected. If the connected device is a PC, press the appropriate Fn hot keys on the computer keyboard to switch the display output to the projector. (Check the PC user manual to determine the appropriate Fn hot keys to change display output.)

- **5.** If more than one input device is connected, press the **Source** button repeatedly to switch among devices.
- **6.** To turn off the projector, press the **Power** button. When the "Power Off?/Press Power again" message appears, press the **Power** button. The projector turns off.







Warning:

Power off the projector accordingly and unplug the power cord before moving the projector.

Setting an Access Password (Security Lock)

You can use the cursor (arrow) buttons to set a password and prevent unauthorized use of the projector. When enabled, the password must be entered after you power on the projector. (See "Navigating the OSD" on page 18 and "Setting the OSD Language" on page 19 for help on using OSD menus.)

Important:

Keep the password in a safe place. Without the password, you will not be able to use the projector. If you lose the password, contact your reseller for information on clearing the password.



- Press the cursor ▲ ▼ button to select
 Advanced Feature and press Enter or ►.
- Press the cursor ▲ ▼ button to select Security Lock.

 Enable. (White text is selected.)
 A password dialog box automatically appears.
- You can only use the following four cursor buttons: ▲ ▼ ◀ ▶
 in the password fields. You can use any combination including the same arrow five times, but not less than six. Press the cursor buttons in any order to set the password.
 When you confirm the password, OK appears.



Adjusting the Projector Level

Take note of the following when setting up the projector:


- •The projector table or stand should be level and sturdy.
- •Position the projector so that it is perpendicular to the screen.
- •Be sure cables are not in the way or can not cause the projector to be knocked over.




- To raise the level of the projector, lift the projector upwards and press the height adjuster button [B] to allow the height adjuster [C] to drop.
- 2. To lower the level of the projector, press the height adjuster button [B] and push down on the projector.
- To adjust the angle of the picture, turn the tilt adjuster [D] right or left until desired angle has been achieved


Adjust the Zoom, Focus and Keystone

- 1. Use the Image-zoom control [A] (on the projector only) to resize the projected image and screen size.
- 2. Use the Image-focus control [B] (on the projector only) to sharpen the projected image.
- 3. Use the Keystone buttons (on the projector or the remote control) to correct image-trapezoid (wider top or bottom) effect.






The keystone control appears on the display.



Adjusting the Volume

1. Press the Volume +/- buttons on the projector or the remote control.

The volume control appears on the display.



2. Use the Volume +/- buttons to adjust the level.



- 3. Press the Mute button (on the remote control only) to turn off the volume.
- 4. Press Volume +/- or Mute on the remote control to turn off mute.







On-Screen Display Menu Controls

The projector has an On-Screen Display (OSD) that lets you make image adjustments and change various settings.

Navigating the OSD

You can use the remote control or the buttons on the top of the projector to navigate and make changes to the OSD. The following illustration shows the corresponding buttons on the remote control and on the projector.



- A. To open the OSD, press the **Menu** button.
- B. There are six menus. Press the cursor◆ ▶ button to move through the menus.
- C. Press the cursor ▲ ▼ button to move up and down in a menu.
- **D.** Press **♦ ▶** to change values for settings.
- E. Press **Menu** to close the OSD or leave a submenu.



Note:

Depending on the video source not all items in the OSD are available. For example, the *Horizontal/Vertical Position* items in the Setup menu can only be modified when connected to a PC. Items that are not available cannot be accessed and are grayed out.

MAINTENANCE AND SECURITY

Replacing the Projection Lamp

The projection lamp should be replaced when it burns out. It should only be replaced with a certified replacement part, which you can order from your local dealer.

Important:

The lamp contains a certain amount of mercury and should be disposed of according to local ordinance regulations.


Avoid touching the glass surface of the new lamp: Doing so may shorten its operation life.

Warning:

Be sure to turn off and unplug the projector at least an hour before replacing the lamp. Failure to do so could result in severe burn.


It is recommended that you do not attempt to replace the lamp while the projector is installed on a ceiling. If you do attempt this, wear protective goggles to prevent glass from a ruptured lamp getting into your eyes.

 Remove the screws on the lamp compartment cover [B].





Cleaning the Projector

Cleaning the projector to remove dust and grime will help ensure trouble-free operation.

Warning:

- 1. Be sure to turn off and unplug the projector at least an hour before cleaning. Failure to do so could result in a severe burn
- 2. Use only a dampened cloth when cleaning. Do not let water to enter the ventilation openings on the projector.
- 3. If a little water gets into the projector interior while cleaning, leave the projector unplugged in a well-ventilated room for several hours before using.
- 4. If a lot of water gets into the projector interior when cleaning, have the projector serviced.

Cleaning the Lens

You can purchase optic lens cleaner from most camera stores. Refer to the following to clean the projector lens.

I.Apply a little optic lens cleaner to a clean soft cloth. (Do not apply the cleaner directly to the lens.)
2.Lightly wipe the lens in a circular motion.

Caution:

- 1. Do not use abrasive cleaners or solvents.
- 2. To prevent discoloration or fading, avoid getting cleaner on the projector case.

Cleaning the Case

Refer to the following to clean the projector case.


- 1. Wipe off dust with a clean dampened cloth.
- 2. Moisten the cloth with warm water and mild detergent (such as used to wash dishes), and wipe the case.
- 3. Rinse all detergent from the cloth and wipe the projector again.

Caution:

To prevent discoloration or fading of the case, do not use abrasive alcohol-based cleaners.

Using the Kensington Lock

If you are concerned about security, attach the projector to a permanent object with the Kensington slot and a security cable.

Contact your vendor for details on purchasing a suitable Kensington security cable.

TROUBLESHOOTING

Common problems and solutions

These guidelines provide tips to deal with problems you may encounter while using the projector. If the problem remains unsolved, contact your dealer for assistance.

Often after time spent troubleshooting, the problem is traced to something as simple as a loose connection. Check the following before proceeding to the problem-specific solutions.

- •Use some other electrical device to confirm that the electrical outlet is working.
- •Ensure the projector is turned on.
- •Ensure all connections are securely attached.
- •Ensure the attached device is turned on.
- •Ensure a connected PC is not in suspend mode.
- •Ensure a connected notebook computer is configured for an external display. (This is usually done by pressing an Fn-key combination on the notebook.)

Tips for Troubleshooting

In each problem-specific section, try the steps in the order as suggested. This may help you to solve the problem more quickly.

Try to pin point the problem and thus avoid replacing non-defective parts.

For example, if you replace batteries and the problem remains, put the original batteries back and go to the next step.

Keep a record of the steps you take when troubleshooting. The information may be useful when calling for technical support or for passing on to service personnel.

Image Problems

Problem: No image appears on the screen

- 1. Verify the settings on your notebook or desktop PC.
- 2. Turn off all equipment and power up again in the correct order.

Problem: The image is blurred

- 1.Adjust the Focus on the projector.
- 2. Press the Auto button on the remote control or projector.
- 3.Ensure the projector-to-screen distance is within the 8-meter (26-feet) specified range.
- 4. Check that the projector lens is clean.
- 5.Make sure the output resolution from the PC is 800 x 600 (SVGA model) or 1024 x 768 (XGA model), the native resolution of the projector.

Problem: The image is wider at the top or bottom (trapezoid effect)

- 1. Position the projector so it is as perpendicular to the screen as possible.
- 2.Use the Keystone button on the remote control or projector to correct the problem.

Problem: The image is reversed or upside down

Check the Projection setting on the Utility menu of the OSD.

Problem: The image is streaked

1.Set the Frequency and Tracking settings on the Utility menu of the OSD to the default settings.

2.To ensure the problem is not caused by a connected PC's video card, connect to another computer.

Problem: The image is flat with no contrast

Adjust the Contrast setting on the Main menu of the OSD.

Problem: The color of the projected image does not match the source image.

Adjust the Color Temperature and Gamma settings on the Main menu of the OSD.

Lamp Problems

Problem: There is no light from the projector

- 1. Check that the power cable is securely connected.
- 2.Ensure the power source is good by testing with another electrical device.
- 3.Restart the projector in the correct order and check that the Power LED is green.
- 4.If you have replaced the lamp recently, try resetting the lamp connections.
- 5. Replace the lamp module.
- 6. Put the old lamp back in the projector and have the projector serviced.

Problem: The lamp goes off

- 1.Power surges can cause the lamp to turn off. Press the power button twice to turn off the projector. When the Lamp Ready LED is on, press the power button.
- 2.Replace the lamp module.
- 3. Put the old lamp back in the projector and have the projector serviced.

Remote Control Problems

Problem: The projector does not respond to the remote control

- 1.Point the remote control towards the remote sensor on the projector.
- 2. Ensure the path between remote and sensor is not obstructed.
- 3. Turn off any fluorescent lights in the room.
- 4. Check the battery polarity of the remote control.
- 5.Replace the batteries.
- 6. Turn off other Infrared-enabled devices in the vicinity.
- 7. Have the remote control serviced

Audio Problems

Problem. There is no sound

- 1.Adjust the projector volume.
- 2.Adjust the volume of the audio source.
- 3.Check the audio cable connection.
- 4. Test the source audio output with other speakers.
- 5. Have the projector serviced.

Problem: The sound is distorted

- 1.Check the audio cable connection.
- 2.Test the source audio output with other speakers.
- 3. Have the projector serviced.

Having the Projector Serviced

If you are unable to solve the problem, you should have the projector serviced. Pack the projector in the original carton. Include a description of the problem and a checklist of the steps you took when trying to fix the problem. The information may be useful to the service personnel. Return the projector to the place you purchased it.





Limited Warranty

What the warranty covers:

ViewSonic warrants its products to be free from defects in material and workmanship, under normal use, during the warranty period. If a product proves to be defective in material or workmanship during the warranty period, ViewSonic will, at its sole option, repair or replace the product with a like product. Replacement product or parts may include remanufactured or refurbished parts or components.

How long the warranty is effective:

North and South America: 3 years for all parts excluding the lamp, 3 years for labor, 1 year for the original lamp from the date of the first consumer purchase.

<u>Europe:</u> 3 years for all parts excluding the lamp, 3 years for labor, 1 year for the original lamp from the date of the first consumer purchase.

Other regions or countries: Please check with your local dealer or local ViewSonic office for the warranty information.

Lamp warranty subject to terms and conditions, verification and approval. Applies to manufacturer's installed lamp only.

All accessory lamps purchased separately are warranted for 90 days.

Who the warranty protects:

This warranty is valid only for the first consumer purchaser.

What the warranty does not cover:
